Key Ideas

The Stone Age can be seen as the start of the development of early human civilization with its move from nomadic groups of hunter gatherers to settled farmers.
The Stone Age is the time in history where weapons and tools were made out of stone.
At the start of the Stone Age, humans were nomadic hunter-gatherers.
They slept in basic shelters, often in the open air or caves. We know this because cave paintings
have been found in many parts of Europe.
Later, they learned how to farm and started to build houses and settle in villages.
Stone age houses were made of wattle and daub, with one room and a fire in the centre.
Britain was joined to Europe by Dogger Bank until 6000 BC. This land bridge enabled people to
move from Europe to settle in Britain. Many of the changes during this period were introduced to
this country by immigrants.
At around 2100 BC, people started to discover that they could make a new metal by mixing
copper and tin. This new metal, bronze, was stronger and easier to use and so the Stone Age



ended and the Bronze Age began.

Skara Brae

Skara Brae is one of the biggest Neolithic settlements anywhere in the world. It is located in the Orkney islands off the Northe-east coast of Scotland. It dates back to about 3000 BC.



How do we know about the Stone Age?

- -The period is called Prehistory because there are no written historical sources of evidence.
- -Archaeological discoveries frequently add different ideas about what life was like during the Stone Age.
