Judaism	Judaism is the world's oldest religion. Followers of Judaism believe in one God who revealed himself through ancient prophets.	seder plate	The Passover Seder Plate is a special plate which contains symbolic foods that are eaten or displayed at the Passover Seder, which is a Jewish holiday
Jewish	A follower of the religion of Judaism	menorah	A sacred candlestick with seven branches used in Jewish worship
synagogue	A Jewish place of worship	Shabbat	The Jewish Sabbath, is Judaism's day of rest on the seventh day of the week - Saturday
Torah scroll	The Torah scroll is a long scroll containing the entire text of the Five Books of Moses, hand-written by a scribe in the original Hebrew.	challah bread	Challah is a special bread usually braided and typically eaten on ceremonial occasions such as Shabbat and major Jewish holidays
mezuzah	A parchment inscribed with religious texts and attached in a case to the doorpost of a Jewish house as a sign of faith.	chanukiah	The Hanukkah menorah or chanukiah is a nine-branched candelabrum lit during the eight-day holiday of Hanukkah

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Creation story important in Judaism and is very similar for Jewish people as it is for Christians, remembering when God created the earth. • Shabbat is the Jewish Sabbath or holy day. • Jewish people celebrate Shabbat from sundown on Friday night to sundown on Saturday night. • A Jewish family celebrates Shabbat each week with a special family meal. • A menorah is lit as part of these celebrations. • Jewish people are not allowed to do any form of work during Shabbat - some do not drive cars, cook meals, switch on electronic devices. • A mezuzah is affixed to the doorpost of Jewish homes to fulfil the mitzvah (Biblical commandment) to "write the words of God on the gates and doorposts of your house". • Passover, or Pesach in Hebrew, is one of the Jewish religion's most sacred and widely observed holidays. • In Judaism, Passover commemorates the story of the Israelites' departure from ancient Egypt • Passover remembers the time when the angel of death passed over Jewish households. • The Seder plate is an important part of the holiday service, at Passover, and dinner and is often a special dish with six designated spaces for each of the symbolic foods. • Easter & Passover are at similar times but are not the same thing. • Jesus was celebrating Passover on the week when he was crucified. • Judaism does not accept Jesus as a divine being, an intermediary between humans and God, a messiah, or holy. • The Maccabees were a group of Jewish rebel warriors who took control of Judea. They are connected to the festival of Hanukkah • Chanukah or Hanukkah is a Jewish festival commemorating the recovery of Jerusalem and subsequent rededication of the Second Temple at the beginning of the Maccabean revolution
